CONTRACTS & GRANTS (Select)

2011-2017: I am a co-Principal Investigator on the McMurdo Dry Valleys (MCM) Long Term Ecological Research Grant funded by the National Science Foundation. This project has involved two trips to Antarctica to conduct fieldwork in the McMurdo Dry Valleys. The grant will result in the publication of an academic monograph on the environmental history of the McMurdo Dry Valleys and a number of other scholarly publications and presentations.

2013-2016, I am a co-PI on a Public Lands History Center (PLHC) project with Scotts Bluff National Monument in Nebraska worth over \$100,000. Work on the project has centered on providing a contemporary academic perspective on the history of Scotts Bluff National Monument and the surrounding region to help inform the renovation of the visitor center.

Spring 2014, Became an co-Investigator on a grant titled "Paisagens em Branco" [Blank Landscapes], which received three years of funding from the Brazilian Antarctic Program to conduct research on the historical archeology and history of seal hunting in the South Shetland Islands, Antarctica. As part of this award I will receive travel funding to conduct research in Europe, North America, and South America.
